PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope everybody is enjoying the summer as much as I am. It's been relatively cool, great for working in the yard. If you're out for a walk in the neighborhood be sure to stop by the Commons, lots of blossoms and greenery.

The Annual Meeting was held in May. Our speaker was Brooke Hardin, the Director of Community Development and Planning with the City. He described the many, many projects in the works around the City, several of which I had not heard about. There was a spirited debate about a couple proposed amendments to the CCHCA bylaws. The swearing-in ceremony for the 2019 CHCA Board was performed by our neighbor and City Council member, Jennifer Passey. Thanks to everybody who took time out of their schedule to attend. Much appreciated.

Many neighbors have stepped up recently to lend a hand with CCHCA. Leslie Cullen has taken over Publications. Nate Hussell has agreed to serve as VP of Social Activities. Jennifer Hanks has taken over as VP of Block Captains. The Garden Club as a collective will be handling Community Appearance. Steven Lane will be heading-up a special committee to update the CCHCA Bylaws. Maria Donahue will be taking care of publication of the CCH Directory. CCHCA does not exist without many helping hands. A big thank you to all.

You may have noticed the new stop signs on Farmington. The City utilizes the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Official (AASHTO) standards to determine whether an intersection warrants a stop sign. Based on those standards, the City concluded that stop signs were required. CCHCA also worked with the City Parking Enforcement to stop the illegal parking on Pinehurst close to the high school.

The never-ending work on the Commons has continued. We planted a fairly large Black Gum, which will add some major color in the Fall. We also planted a new Diane Witch Hazel and a Shamrock Holly, as well as many, many other smaller plantings. During the work day held in May a ton of mulch was spread and a lot of weeding done. We'll be having other work day soon - don't miss your chance to be a part of the solution.

Plans are underway for the Labor Day picnic. Mark your calendars. It will be held on September 2nd, 4 to 7 pm.

CCHCA is also working with the City to inquiry about all the power outages in the neighborhood. Stay tuned.

Google-Group Guidelines 2019

Please Note: Only members of the CCH Civic Association have the privilege to post messages. A non-member resident is allowed one posted message, and shall be reminded of the Google-Group guidelines, and invited to join CCHCA.

The Google group is a valuable service to our neighborhood. The primary role of the Google group is to provide the CCHCA a quick and efficient means of communication to a large majority of households on matters of importance to the neighborhood.

The guidelines strike a balance between accommodating individual requests to reach neighbors while maintaining the Association's ability to reach as many residents as possible quickly. From past experience, overuse of the Google group for individual needs can cause some neighbors to unsubscribe in turn reducing the overall effectiveness of the group as a means of communication.

The following guidelines shall be used when posting and responding to Google group messages:

- 1. Limit topics to pertinent local information of interest to CCH residents
- 2. Do not post the City's <u>routine</u> message, which are included in its many public publications
- **3.** Provide email address for replies; phone numbers are optional. Do not include business/company signatures or footers.or any marketing.
- **4.** Post only one message per event/issue. Combine several messages into one post. <u>For CCHCA and Historic Blenheim events more than one post is permitted.</u>
- 5. Post items for sale by CCH residents excluding items belonging to third parties or commercial entities
- **6**. Reply to posted email address if shown in the message, otherwise click on "reply", **NOT "reply all.**"

7. Do not post:

"Thank you", "Good job!", "Dog/cat has been found" or "Item no longer available" messages but reply to each responder individually.

Charity solicitations, political, religious, sexual and commercial messages.

Messages on behalf of non-CCHCA member or items for sale or rent outside the limits of the CCH community.

- **8**. Please visit our website for recommended contractors, pet and babysitters before requesting recommendations via the Google-Group
- **9**.Please consider using the community facebook page for communications that do not fall within these guidelines.

All messages are screened by the moderators before group delivery to assure adherence to these guidelines. The moderators make the final decision. If approved, your message will be usually posted within one hour but extend 12 hours, however, the moderators cannot guarantee posting by a certain time.

If you have any questions or are uncertain about something you would like to post, please contact the group moderators at mailto:ggmoderator@cchca.org Suggestions for revision and appropriateness will be

CCH WEBSITE

The menus have also been reorganized a bit. It's always a work in progress but it's getting better all the time.

We recently added a <u>calendar</u>, which will hopefully make it easier to find out what's happening in CCHCA.

New residents might not be aware of all the information about the history of CCH available on the website. See the History tab towards the upper-right. Directories, newsletters, flyers, pictures, newspaper articles from as far back as the 50s can be viewed. Kind of fun to check out. Thanks to Ernie Klimonda for working so hard to preserve those memories.

Digging Through CCH History

History, according to Winston Churchill, is written by the victors. It can also apparently be written by the CCH Historian, a role I took on a year or so but have sadly neglected until recently. Although I have managed to fulfill one of the chief responsibilities of the historian, that of taking several cardboard boxes from someone else's basement and putting them in my basement. Today, for some reason, I am inspired to dig more deeply into these boxes, and share with you what I find.

There's a treasure trove of stuff from the mid-1960s, all neatly stored in plastic sleeves and binders, saved by some archivally minded neighbor. A few random nuggets:

A vehicle bridge connecting Spring Lake Terrace to Route 50 was proposed in 1968, according to a special color issue, including a hand-drawn map, of the *Country Club Hills News*

that urged citizens to SPEAK UP NOW! Apparently they were heard loud and clear, as no bridge was ever built.

CCH purchased a mimeograph machine in July 1963, to speed up the production of newsletters, according to the *CCH Bulletin* of that month, presumably cranked out on said machine. The bulletin was written by then vice-president Armistice Turtora, a long-time CCH resident who passed away at the age of 90 last year, who was still active when we moved to the neighborhood in 2000. Armistice (born November 11, hence the name), the first chairperson of the city's Parks and Recreation Board, was honored for her work when the city named the field at Van Dyck Park for her.

The average expenditure per pupil in Fairfax County was \$489 in 1966 (it is \$14,767 today), according to a bound report under the name of E.C Funderburk, superintendent of schools.

Mr. and Mrs. John Veger of 305 Springlake Terrace won first place in the outdoor lighting contest in 1964, for which they were awarded \$8.00 (worth \$65 today), noted on a perfectly preserved flyer.



CCH used to have a Tuesday Afternoon Club, of which Mrs. Elizabeth Todd was president in 1965, according to that year's typed and hand-illustrated directory. There is no mention of what used to happen on Tuesday afternoons.

Let's see — what else is in here. Digging a little deeper ...

In the 1980s, the newsletter was renamed *Echoes From the Hills*, with the word "echoes" repeated in smaller and smaller type, fading away like an echo – apparently a forerunner to today's eCCHo. Joe and Marge Herrmann won the "beauty spot of the month" in April 1986, as noted in an article by Arlene Desmarais, president of the CCH Garden Club.

The Echo/Eccho "logo" has apparently changed at least 20 times since 2004 — as each new editor says "to hell with 'brand compliance'; I finally get to do it my way."


Hildie Carney (still a resident of CCH, who appears not to have changed a bit) was nominated as Mrs. United States Navy, 1956, according to a clipping from the newsletter of the US Naval Air Station, Pensacola. The clip also notes that Hildie was an "avid water skier."

It's interesting to go through the old directories and see what names you recognize. Some people have lived here a really long time.

I also found a few things with personal connections. A picture of my kids (now college-aged) as toddlers at a picnic on the Commons. Photos of us and other early 2000s-era new CCHers planting trees that are now 20 feet tall. A directory from 2004, with assistance from membership VP Jill Toth and original cover art by Michelle Rummel. A newsletter I did in May 2002 (the very first "eCCHo"). It makes you feel old when you root through "History" boxes and find things you were part of, like when you see a lunchbox or board game you used to own in an antique store. But it also makes you feel like part of a community that has some pretty deep roots. And with nearly 20 years in Country Club Hills now, I guess we are starting to become part of that history.

I invite anyone who wants to, to stop by and have a look through the boxes. And if you have anything you want to contribute – please let me know.





Power Outages

As everyone is very aware, CCH has recently experienced a series of extended power outages. CCH has a long history of power issues going back many decades. CCHCA has been in contact with the Mayor, the City Manager, and members of the City Council about the issue. The City has pledge to work with the power company to come up with a plan. They promised to get back to us on next steps. CCHCA will continue to inquiry with the City on progress and report back to the neighborhood.

Beauty Spot of July

This July many CCH neighbors have creatively decorated their landscapes with patriotic stars and stripes and richly colored flowers just in time for holiday visitors. At 3420 Park Hill Place, Pam and Steve Caruso have made major changes to their landscape giving it a new look. The Country Hills Garden Club chooses their ambitious DIY garden project as the Beauty Spot of the Month. The updated design has kept several established plants in place. Curbside barberry and crepe myrtle bushes define the front edge of the garden. Beyond these, a hillside rises to mature holly and azalea bushes and a sturdy maple tree close to the house. After their research for plants of differing foliage, flowering displays, and growth habits, the Caruso's added rows of hardy evergreens, perennials, and ground covers to prevent hill erosion and to ensure eye-catching colors season to season. During this month, their front yard shows off many of Virginia's best-loved flowers, including the scarlet rose, lavender hosta, mauve hydrangea, blue spiderwort, pink crepe myrtle, creamy sweetspire, and orange daylily. A new flagstone path leads to more visual delights in the lower side yard. At a tranquil corner, an American flag unfurls in summer breezes and butterflies flutter near pale purple blooms on a buddleia bush. Much pleased with their accomplishments, Pam and Steve say their dream garden is still a work in progress. They won't be hanging up their garden hoses and tools yet!

COUNTRY HILLS GARDEN CLUB

Country Hills Garden Club will have its first meeting of the 2019-2020 year on September 10. Our program will be on Sustainable Gardening. We will visit Pat Sawhney's garden sanctuary in Annandale. Her property has extensive landscaping and other waster remediation efforts to successfully mitigate water runoff from the road, including the swale in the back yard. The back yard features shade tolerant plants, including many purchased from the annual NVSCCD Native Seedling Sales of past years. Her site uses no chemicals or pesticides and is a Certified Wildlife Habitat. HORTICULTURE TIPS:

- (1). Fall is fast approaching. Buy some spring blooming bulbs and pansies to plant in large pots outdoors. Put eight or so bulbs in potting soil in the lower third of the pot, cover with an inch of potting soil and sprinkle with a little medicated foot powder (any brand will do) if you have squirrels or rabbits. Continue filling the pot with soil and top with the pansies. Place in a sunny spot and watch the pansies bloom all fall and winter and the bulbs pop through them in the spring. You can also do this using several varieties of bulbs that you plant at different levels in the pot for multiple height, kinds and colors of flowers next spring. Because of the cold winters the last few years, in November wrap the pots in bubble wrap or burlap tied with string. Water after planting and occasionally throughout the winter to prevent the pansies from drying out. Do not overwater or the bulbs will rot.
- (2) Try planting hyacinths among other flowers and shrubs to deter deer from browsing. They have a long bloom time and like a number of other plants they emit an odor that the deer do not like.









